LGMA Constituency Working Groups: Results of first call for Expressions of Interest

LGMA Working Groups on Adaptation, Climate Finance, Communications, Just Transition and Loss & Damage

Updated 18 May 2026

I. Overview

After the expiry of the deadline for expressions of interest to (co-)lead or participate in the five initial Working Groups for 2026 to 2027 (Adaptation, Climate Finance, Communications, Just Transition and Loss & Damage), a total of 65 expressions of interest have been submitted by Constituency members.

This document profiles each Working Groups' expressions of interest in more detail, giving an overview of interested co-leads and analyzing the composition of both the co-leads and participants in terms of the diversity criteria laid out in the [LGMA Working Groups Terms of Reference](#) (section IV, 4), as follows:

LGMA advocacy should be informed by the perspectives of those most affected by climate change, while also addressing existing participation imbalances and strengthening the legitimacy, inclusivity, and practical relevance of Working Group outputs. Therefore, Working Groups should strive to have diverse and balanced participation, taking into account diverse representation of:

- a. Networks of local and other subnational governments and other organizations represented within the LGMA. Organizations are encouraged to have no more than 2 representatives per Working Group*
- b. Geographic regions, especially from the Global South*
- c. Gender*
- d. Types of subnational government(s) (networks) represented (e.g. local governments, state or regional governments, devolved administrations)*

II. Outcomes

1. Two of the Working Groups – **Climate Finance and Just Transition** – can be considered fully-formed based on our criteria for composition in the Working Group TOR. Climate Finance is particularly strong, with well-balanced, wide-ranging participation.

2. The remaining three Working Groups – **Adaptation, Communications and Loss & Damage** – will require further action.
 - a. For the **Adaptation** Working Group, three people have expressed their interest in (co-)leadership.
 - i. The Working Group TOR states: IV.3.e. *Where more than two expressions of interest for leads are received, candidates are encouraged to agree among themselves on proposed co-leads.*
 - b. For the Communications Working Group, 3 people from ICLEI have expressed their interest in participating, and one of the co-leads is from ICLEI.
 - i. The Working Group TOR states: IV.4.a. *Organizations are encouraged to have no more than 2 representatives per Working Group*
 - c. For the **Loss & Damage** Working Group, there has not yet been any expression of interest in (co-)leadership.
 - i. The Working Group TOR states: IV.3.f. *Where no expressions of interest for leads are received, the Steering Committee may seek a lead from the Members, appoint a lead or dissolve the Working Group*
3. Overall Working Group co-lead organizational balance has been achieved (no organizations are over-represented in WG leadership):
 - a. Adaptation: Regions4, European Committee of the Regions, EU Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy
 - b. Finance: FMDV, Buenos Aires City Government
 - c. Communications: ICLEI, Quebec Government, Under2Coalition
 - d. Just Transition: C40
 - e. Loss & Damage: No co-lead currently
4. Based on the other criteria in the Working Group TOR, from the 65 Expressions of Interest:
 - a. 45 are from the Global North, and 20 are from the Global South
 - b. 34 identify as female and 31 identify as male
 - c. Of the 15 government representatives, 6 represent local governments, 7 represent state or regional governments, and 2 represent devolved administrations

FMDV has developed a comprehensive approach combining policy advocacy, financial engineering, and operational implementation. Over the years, we have built a strong track record in the planning and implementation of both mitigation and adaptation projects addressing the impacts of climate change, whether through our own resources or by accessing international financing from numerous institutions. In recent years, Buenos Aires has explored options such as the issuance of green bonds and other instruments within the framework of carbon markets. In addition, the City is working on the development of a Climate Budget, a tool that will not only provide greater visibility into the structure of the City's budget and the allocation of funds to climate-related projects, but also enable forward planning and coordination across different government areas to prioritize actions established under the Climate Action Plan.</p> <p>While these initiatives and experiences place us in a strong position to lead the group, we are fully aware that there is still a long way to go. The launch of our fourth Climate Action Plan will continue to advance Buenos Aires' commitment to becoming a carbon-neutral city by 2050—an ambitious goal that requires access to international financing to meet these global challenges, not only by implementing innovative projects but also by ensuring they are inclusive and tailored to local needs.</p>	<p>The City of Buenos Aires has been working on climate finance for many years, not only advancing access to such financing but also building capacities to improve both access opportunities and the quality of related projects. Buenos Aires has extensive experience in the issuance of financial instruments, including bonds in both domestic and international markets, as well as in engaging with multilateral organizations and international climate networks to implement projects aligned with its climate agenda and policies, covering both mitigation and adaptation priorities. Examples of such projects include improvements to public transport in the city, such as the Metrobus system, and hydraulic infrastructure works aimed at preventing flooding.</p> <p>This process has been accompanied by the strengthening of internal technical capacities and the development of strategic frameworks. The City of Buenos Aires was the first jurisdiction in Argentina and one of the first in the region to adopt a Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation Law. It has also published three Climate Action Plans (with a fourth update currently underway).
